Although it is more expensive for my business, I have chosen to go with paper bags this year at my booth. If retailers (small, medium and large) feel strongly enough about reducing or eliminating the use of single-use plastic in their businesses, they will make the decision to act and will find ways to make it happen while staying profitable.
